English Conversation Workshop

R.E.A.D. is thrilled to offer another free service to help our adults in the community improve their conversational English skills. This workshop is offered monthly at Loutit District Library.

Over half of our forty students are ESL (English as a Second Language) learners. They can speak in their native language but long to improve their English skills so they can continue to assimilate into their community and adopted country.

Many of R.E.A.D.'s ESL students have weekly English classes at St. Patrick's and also work with a tutor from our organization. When they return home they tend to speak their native language and do not practice their English skills. Our students expressed an interest in additional time that they could practice speaking and listening with other ESL students in an informal setting.

Since the English Conversation Workshop began in September, tutors and students from different countries (Bhutan, Colombia, Mexico, Italy and Spain) and backgrounds get together and laugh and enjoy each other's stories and improve their English skills.

Budha Chuwan arrived in the United States from Nepal with her family at the age of 17 and began working with R.E.A.D. tutor, Alice Mohr in 2013. Alice was a reading specialist for 30 years and recently retired.

Budha spoke very little English when she entered Grand Haven High School and was assessed at a 3rd grade reading level. After two years of tutoring Budha improved to a 6th grade level and now speaks English very well. Graduating from Grand Haven High School in January of 2015 she has worked full time at the Holiday Inn to help support her family. Alice and Budha have not limited their time together

to reading. Alice has familiarized Budha with American cultural experiences: dining out, banking, budgeting, and having a pedicure and her hair cut in a salon. Alice even hosted a graduation open house for Budha.

Budha has a goal and Alice has helped make that goal achievable. She would like to become a cosmetologist. Together they researched the requirements to attend French Academy in Spring Lake. They rented the cosmetology book and have been reviewing the vocabulary all summer. Alice helped her fill out student aid applications and put her in touch with Sandy Huber of the Grand Haven Community Foundation Scholarship Fund. Budha was awarded a full Pell grant in addition to a grant from the community foundation. She began classes on August 30th, 2015 and will continue to work at the Holiday Inn as well as attend school. Without a vehicle she depends on a bike or Harbor Transit for transportation.

Alice has been more than a tutor; she is a mentor, a friend, and a second mother to Budha. They are mutually appreciative of each other and love working as a team, an amazingly dedicated and successful team.

Student Diana Torres cannot stress enough how much her tutor, Mary Willink, has helped her, "Mrs. Mary is a wonderful teacher and always encouraging. She is like my angel and has made everything possible for me, I love her." A native of Colombia, Diana has a degree in Communications and

She volunteers at Job Seekers, St. Patrick's Hispanic Ministry, and has attended classes at MCC. Mary, who in her 38 year career has been an elementary school principal and taught English at all grade levels says, "I have great admiration and appreciation for Diana, she is highly motivated, curious, hard working and a joy to work with, she is bright and beautiful."

Excerpt from an Essay Written about R.E.A.D. by Student Ian Johnson for David Theune's class at Spring Lake High School

How often do you read? When did you first learn to read? First book? First word, even? These are things we take for granted, and you probably can't even begin to answer any of these questions because to us they are virtually irrelevant. Everyone can read, can't they? A New York Times article, published in 2009, reported a study by the University of California that concluded that around 100,000 words cross the average American's eyes each day. However, many adults struggle with reading and understanding even a few of these words: "In the United States 63 million adults of the country's population, 16 and over, -- don't read well enough to understand a newspaper story written at the eighth grade level". Right here in our own community 7% of all adults lack these basic literacy skills. Ottawa County has a population of over 270,000 people, that is over 18,000 adults who lack the basic skills to read and write efficiently.

Fortunately, we have an organization right here in our community that is devoted to lowering the illiteracy rate in adults in Ottawa County. R.E.A.D. (Reading Enables Adult Development) Ottawa is a non-profit organization where volunteer tutors meet with people in our community who lack efficient reading and writing skills once a week to help them obtain those skills. All of R.E.A.D.'s tutors are strictly volunteers and do not receive any sort of compensation, which is why R.E.A.D. needs the support of our community. These volunteers must be qualified by taking a 10 hour training session prior to tutoring. That is what the money would go towards, sending these volunteers through the training session so they can start helping out the people in our own county.

Being able to read is something we often take for granted and we are fortunate to have had great parents and a great school system to teach us these important literary skills at such a young age. But not all people have been given the same opportunities as we have and it is important we try and give them the wonderful skills of reading and writing so they can succeed.

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
